Dock Pilings

It was quite a show at the Dutch Island dock area in early March when a truck with a very long bed was unloaded with new pilings. Board member Mike Weathers said the old pilings were between 40 and 50 feet long and only provided two to three feet of clearance during high tide. The new 60-65 foot pilings (when driven) allow for a 10-foot clearance. Weathers says these new pilings will provide ample clearance during spring tides and storm surges.



Other dock projects include new signage, replacing a cleat, repairing dock separation and installing new



piling caps. Look for more stories about the dock and Mike's other projects in future newsletter editions.

Dock Congestion

Initially posted on the Dutch Island Facebook page, this piece is a recap about best Dock practices:

- Make sure your boat has a DI decal want details? Write: info@dutchisland.net
- Dock hold about 30 boats (based on 19-foot average size)
 - Double moor at your own risk.
- Put your engine down while mooring. Moor your lines tightly perpendicular to dock.
 - Three-day maximum overnight docking.
- Snug up the boat in front of you as far as possible. About 3 to 4 feet.
 - Practice social distancing on the deck.
- No parties, no congregating per social distancing guidelines.
